I wish you to advise me by return mail relative to what action you expect to take in repaying George Sam, Indian, for freight bill against the carload of horses shipped from Sacramento to Laws for the Inyo County fair. The shipment came billed in your name and the charges were \$165.00. This amount has been advanced in anticipation of your repaying same.

George also wishes me to make inquiry regarding his black mare, also what disposition you wish made of your horses. As the horses are in a pasture near Bishop at the present time it is necessary that something be done with them as early as possible.

On account of some existing differences between George Sam, Indian, and Curley Fletcher over some horses which I understand are now in pasture at your place, I wish to advise that you not permit any of the horses belonging to either Curley Fletcher or George Sam, ~~xxx~~ to leave the pasture until Sam returns from Mono Lake, and arrange to make a settlement relative to outstanding obligations against these horses.

It is necessary that you make some arrangements about the horses here, at an early date.

The horse known as ~~as payment~~ the one which you purchased from Lee Kline is only partly paid for, and unless you finish payment this month, the horse will be taken back by the original owners.

Everett Kline states that \$75.00 was the amount which you agreed to pay, and that you have only paid something like \$20. of this amount.

You I have looked for you here before this, but as you have not appeared, it will now be necessary that you make some arrangement to pay the balance, or let the horse go back to the original owners.

This matter should be attended to before Dec. 15. and I would advise you to see Everett Kline at once and settle same.

Dear Sir:-

Your letter of Dec. 2, at hand and am glad to know that you will settle up this matter without further proceedings.

I knew nothing of this matter until informed through the Indians and later direct from the S.P. Agent at Laws, that a car-load of horses were being held at Laws, pending the payment of freight charges. The agent advised that same were shipped billed to C.P. Fletcher as Consignee.

The Freight bill's covering charges are enclosed. One reads---13 head of horses-- amount of charges, \$151.00. The other reads---To pay feed charges Mojave to Laws, \$4.00. This makes a total amount of \$155.00, which was paid by me as indicated by the enclosed receipt, signed by the agent and cashier of the S.P.R.R. at Laws, California.

This amount I would ask you to kindly refund to me by Check, Draft, Money Order or otherwise, the same made out to Ray R. Parrett, Supt. U.S. Indian Service.

As to your contract with George Sam, I will do what I can to straighten out the matter, but this is a separate matter from the foregoing freight bill. I imagine that this will require both yourself and George Sam together, to set a satisfactory adjustment.

The horses are now at the Four C. Ranch at Bishop, and I would suggest that you and George Sam get together on what disposition you are going to make of them, as soon as possible.

George Sam is now at Mono Lake, and I have notified him to come to Bishop to attend to his part regarding them.
