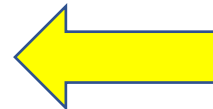

Advanced Search

There is a search interface with Films on Demand. In the search bar, you will see that you can search through titles and segments. Basically, the title is the name of the film and the segment is a 'chapter' of the film. Alternatively, you can also browse for films. You can look at producers, such as National Geographic, History, or HBO Documentaries. You can also look by Subject. To browse this way, click on the menu icon

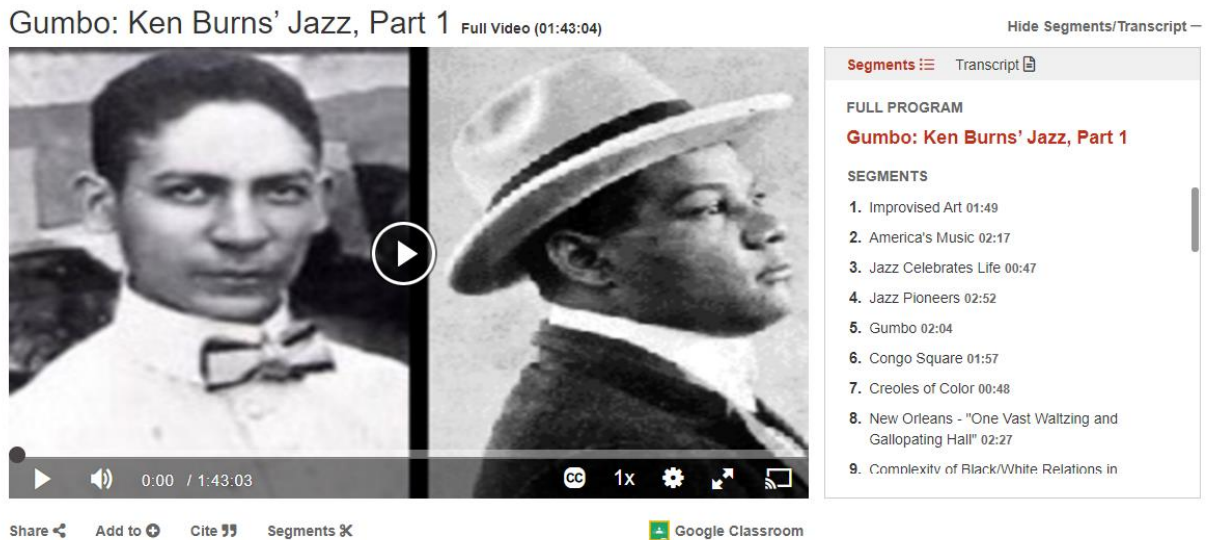

Using A Film in Films on Demand

Below is an image of what a film looks like in Films on Demand. It is similar to Youtube in both layout and operation.



A useful feature of Films on Demand is the ability to search the Transcript of a film. Click the Transcript button and a transcript is provided. Search for a term and the film will sync to the words on the transcript. There is also a citation button if you decide to use a film in a paper.
